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# From the Director

Not only is it hard to summarize the 2020-21 academic year; it is hard even to look back on it. Our center and our university were shuttered for in-person events due to the lingering and devastating global coronavirus pandemic. To make matters worse, worldwide processes of democratic backsliding and erosion kept gathering steam. America itself was anything but immune to this global trend. The integrity of our presidential elections was falsely impugned by the outgoing president, who then instigated a violent assault on our nation's Capitol in a last-ditch effort to interrupt a constitutional transfer of office and to retain power for himself. In tandem with dramatically downward trajectories for rights and freedoms in places ranging from Belarus and Hungary to Hong Kong and Myanmar, and from India and Ethiopia to Nicaragua and Brazil, it was truly an annus horribilis for global democracy as well as for global public health.

At WCED, we are committed to pushing back against these negative trends with every resource at our disposal. Even while doing our small part to help contain COVID-19 by keeping all our events fully virtual, we continued to advance our understanding of democratic emergence and its many opposites, including democratic backsliding. As ever, we did this collective work through our three core activities: events, publications, and fellowships.

While virtual, our 2020-21 calendar was packed with events that spoke to major challenges of the moment. We introduced a new flashpoint series to gather experts to discuss unfolding crises in Belarus, Hong Kong, and Lebanon. We hosted public talks on autocratic courts in Africa, the use of repression in both authoritarian regimes and democracies, and global varieties of populism. In the wake of January's contested transfer of power, we arranged a conversation between Hahrie Han (Johns Hopkins) and Michael McFaul (Stanford) on the theme of reviving democracy, globally and locally. We then redoubled our focus on local threats to democracy in our emergency roundtable this spring on submerging democracy in America's states: an issue that will surely continue to command our attention in the year to come, especially as it unfolds right here in Michigan.

One of our innovations over the past few years has been to pair major public roundtables with thematic issues of *Democracy & Autocracy*, the official newsletter of the American Political Science Association's eponymous organized section, which we now publish here at WCED (along with our rapidly growing WCED book series at the University of Michigan Press, with nine published and forthcoming titles). We organized one roundtable and subsequent newsletter on democratic survival in the Muslim world, and another on the challenges of constraining presidents in democratic and authoritarian regimes alike. As with almost all of our events, these roundtables bring leading experts to Michigan—even if lately only on Zoom—for indepth conversations with our own faculty and WCED fellows. A silver lining of the virtual format is that we recorded all our public events, and you can watch any you missed (or re-watch any you especially enjoyed) on our YouTube channel.

As always, the people we bring together are the best part of WCED, and the support we offer their research on democracy and authoritarianism is the most important thing we do. In response to our global health crisis, we focused our faculty research fellowships on COVID-19, funding one project on vaccine hesitancy and rising distrust of democracy in the wake of the pandemic, and another on how the virus has been politically weaponized by the Orban regime in Hungary. Our core roster of four postdoctoral fellows continued their remarkable research projects under the extreme duress of being unable to



travel internationally or even work in an office. Graduate students continued to apply for funds from across the university to do path-breaking research even under travel constraints, and we funded them at unprecedented levels. Our incoming cast of WCED graduate fellows came from all over the world, even if many of them couldn't come to the United States yet. I urge you to read more about all these amazing young scholars and the work they do in the report that follows.

We hope that you and your loved ones all stayed healthy over the past year. Fingers crossed, we will be able to welcome you all back safely to Weiser Hall this coming fall. It has been far too long, and we have so much urgent work to do together. The stakes for democracy both at home and globally could not be higher.


