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Amnesty International

History

- Amnesty International (AI) originated when two Portuguese students were unjustly imprisoned for raising a toast to freedom.
- Their story was published, and thousands of individuals wrote letters to government officials, demonstrating the power of collective action.
- Since then, AI has released tens of thousands of wrongly imprisoned individuals, has grown to encompass 7 million members in 150 countries, and was awarded the 1977 Nobel Peace Prize for their actions.

Vision

- AI is independent of any government, political ideology, economic interest, or religion.
- Its vision is a world in which every person enjoys all of the human rights enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and other international human rights standards.

Mission

- To achieve its vision, AI sees it as its mission to undertake research and take action focused on preventing and ending grave abuses of human rights. AI carries out a wide range of educational activities, promoting the values contained in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and other international agreed human rights standards.

Values

- AI is a global movement of seven million members, supporters and activists across the world standing up for humanity and human rights. AI's purpose is to protect individuals wherever justice, fairness, freedom, and truth are denied. With these values at our heart, AI has stopped torture, freed prisoners, prevented executions, and saved homes.

Goals:


1. To understand AI purposes and methods that would help with the rest of our projects.
2. To be part of the force in releasing unfairly imprisoned individuals. We furthered this goal by sharing the W4R campaigns with GSP members, helping us receive many signatures to add to our letters of protest.
3. Encourage us to familiarize other students and faculty with Amnesty and a human rights issue at an informal level.
4. Enabling us to take action for the human rights of those unfairly imprisoned.
5. Bring a new perspective to AI's work and possibly new improvements. This would also be beneficial to us as students, furthering our own human rights knowledge and activism.

Projects:

1. The completion of an "Introductory Worksheet," after reviewing the website for the USA sector for Amnesty International (AI).
2. Write for Rights (W4R) campaign.
3. Plan a public event on an AI issue. We decided to show a documentary about the relationship between climate change and refugees, followed by discussions on how the participants' views changed or not.
4. Responded individually to three Urgent Action (UA) cases.
5. Research and write a paper individually about one issue from "Our Core Work" on the Amnesty International USA website.




