My research incorporates textual analyses and material culture studies to investigate the dynamics of empires in early East Asia. In particular, my work on pastoral nomadic regimes challenges normative constructs of cultural politics, economic systems and sociopolitical institutions. I have conducted examinations of ancient Chinese documents, as well as led archaeological survey and excavation projects in various regions of Mongolia. This interdisciplinary approach lies at the core of my book on the Xiongnu to construct a multi-faceted narrative of the world's first nomadic empire and demonstrate its lasting impact on the history of pre-modern Asia. I apply these interdisciplinary approaches as well to research and seminars on Central Asia during the era of the Silk Roads, and carry these historical-archaeological endeavors into my current fieldwork on local palaces and frontier constituents of the Mongol Empire.
