As a faculty member who conducts research with racial/ethnic minority underserved transgender populations and highly values diversity and inclusion in terms of faculty, staff, and students, I contribute to diversity at UCSF at many levels as outlined in my Service Activities summary. Furthermore, my area of research focuses specifically on transgender women of color who represent the population most impacted by HIV and yet are also the most underserved. I am the only faculty member at UCSF that specifically specializes in community-based research with transgender communities of color. My research staff is comprised entirely of racial/ethnic minority transgender people and/or transgender women and many of the students and postdocs I have supervised and mentored identify as racial/ethnic minority and/or transgender. For four iterations of the National Transgender Health Summit I have served as the Research Track Chair, and I was a co-founder of the Center of Excellence for Transgender Health, which has made UCSF a highly visible leader in the field of transgender health. Currently, I serve as Vice Chair on the UCSF Academic Senate on Equal Opportunity and look forward to continuing to contribute to important diversity goals at UCSF and beyond.

## **TEACHING AND MENTORING**

### **TEACHING SUMMARY**

Teaching and mentoring others has always been an extremely rewarding activity for me. As research faculty, teaching has not been a primary expectation and developing my program of research has been my foremost priority to date. Much of my most recent teaching experience comes from delivering successful guest lectures and seminars through the Social & Behavioral Sciences track for first year medical students as well as the Transgender Health elective. In addition, I have led multiple seminars for junior faculty, post-doctoral students, and graduate students at UCSF, UCB, the Wright Institute, and SFSU related to the conduct of sensitive and inclusive research with vulnerable populations. I mentor several junior faculty, post-doctoral scholars, and students, and have served on several dissertation committees. I look forward to increased opportunities for teaching and mentoring during my professional development as a faculty member.

### RESEARCH AND CREATIVE ACTIVITIES SUMMARY

As an Associate Professor in Residence, I have successfully made the transition from a mentored investigator funded by an Early Career Development award (K08) to an independent clinical researcher funded by several NIH grants, including two R34 awards, an R21, an R01 funded in 2015, and a large award from the California HIV/AIDS Research Program. I have established myself as an independent clinical investigator recognized nationally and internationally in the field of transgender health and HIV prevention and treatment. My research is focused on the investigation of risk and protective factors in transgender communities and the relationship between stigma, discrimination, and health-related behaviors and outcomes. My efforts have primarily been dedicated to helping to develop, implement, and evaluate health promotion interventions that decrease health risks and HIV infection and improve treatment through behavioral changes, community programming, and increased access to culturally appropriate health care.

In 2012, I completed a K08 award during which I received additional training and mentoring in theory evaluation and application, measurement development, clinical trials methodology, and intervention development. I have subsequently leveraged this Career Development Award to successfully compete for several NIH grants focused on intervention development and testing, including two R34 grants and an R01 award. With several additional successful proposals, including funding from the California HIV/AIDS Research Program and several internal UCSF awards, I have expanded my area of research to include examining implementation of pre-exposure prophylaxis with trans communities and treatment as prevention with people who are living with HIV, focusing on access to health care and treatment initiation and adherence.

Two of the interventions I have been developing and testing have already been selected for implementation in real world settings. My Healthy Divas intervention for transgender women living with HIV is part of a national "Evidence to Implementation (E2i)" initiative funded by

Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and is being implemented in three different cities in the U.S. My Girlfriends Connect intervention for transgender women re-entering the community after a period of incarceration has been funded as a service program of the San Francisco Mayor's Office on Community Housing and Development. Agencies and community leaders are rightfully demanding efficacious culturally relevant interventions to curb the devastating impact of HIV on transgender communities of color, which have been left behind in the fight against HIV in the U.S. I strive to continue to build a research portfolio that balances the community's impassioned outcry for urgent action with the measured, scientific rigor necessary to confidently move forward with an agenda that seeks to illuminate and remedy the health disparities experienced by historically marginalized and underserved populations.

The purpose of this study is to assess the feasibility and acceptability of Sheroes, a theory-driven, culturally grounded intervention to reduce sexual risk behavior among transgender women at risk for HIV acquisition or transmission.
